College Enrollment and Work Activity of 2010 High School Graduates

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COLLEGE ENROLLMENT AND WORK ACTIVITY OF 2010 HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES

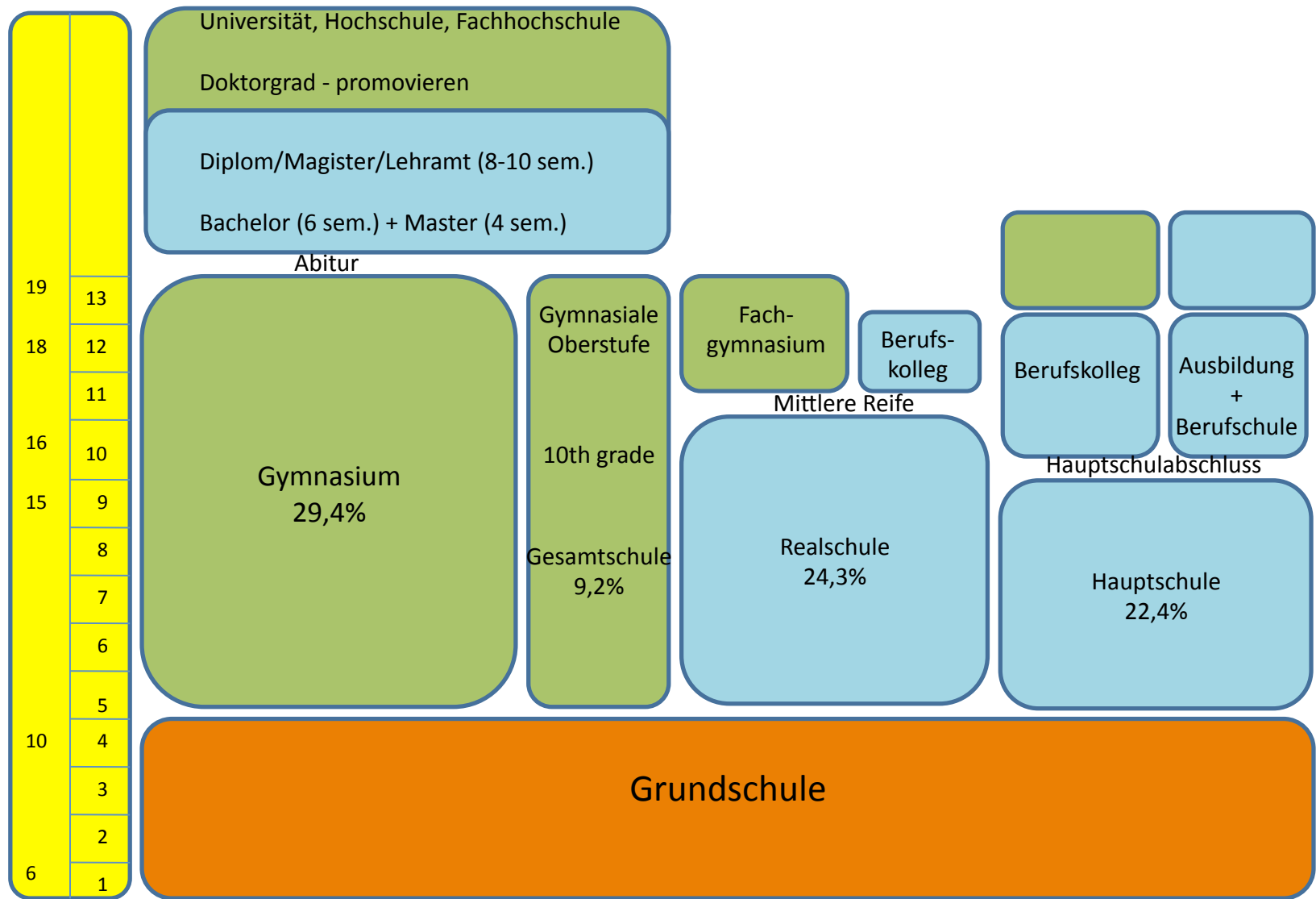
In October 2010, 68.1 percent of 2010 high school graduates were enrolled in colleges or universities, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today.

Recent high school graduates not enrolled in college in October 2010 were more likely than enrolled graduates to be working or looking for work (76.6 percent compared with 40.0 percent).

Information on school enrollment and work activity is collected monthly in the Current Population Survey (CPS), a nationwide survey of about 60,000 households that provides information on employment and unemployment.

Each October, a supplement to the CPS gathers more detailed information about school enrollment, such as full- and part-time enrollment status. Additional information about the

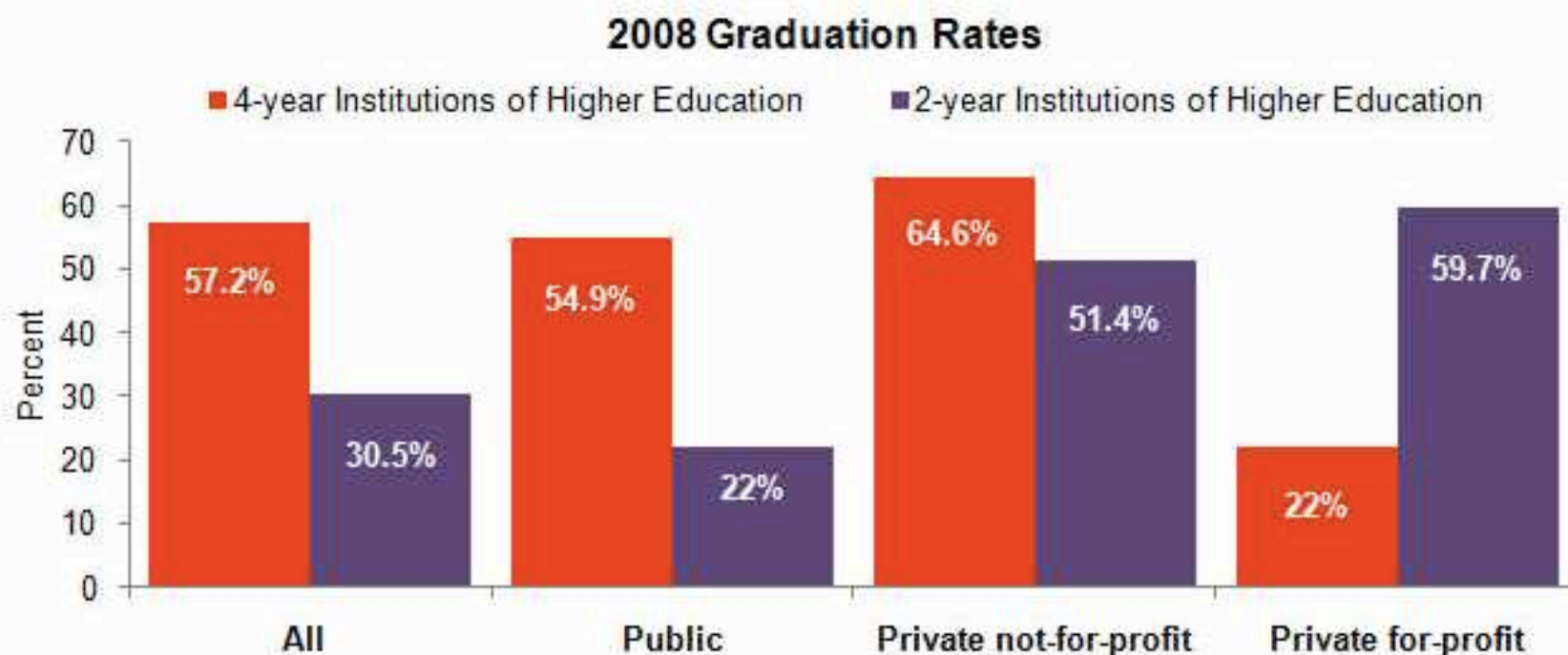

Figure 1 shows that in 2008, based on [data just released](#) by NCES, four-year IHEs graduated less than 60 percent of their students in six years. Public colleges and universities do a bit worse than not-for-profit institutions, which on average do a bit better. As my colleagues and I have [demonstrated elsewhere](#), the range of graduation rates is far too great, with some schools graduating hardly anyone who starts and others graduating almost everyone. Four-year for-profit schools, such as the University of Phoenix, Kaplan University, and DeVry University, represent the fastest-growing segment of higher education in the United States. However, on average, schools in that sector graduate only around 20 percent of their students within six years.
